## MINNESOTA FELLOWSHIP

The Minnesota Fellowship held a retreat in May at Villa Maria. The Rev. Masud Syedullah was retreat director. He is rector of a parish in Tulsa, OK, where he first became interested in the Society of St. Francis in 1977. He was professed in 1983, and his wife Jan was professed in 1986. He is chaplain for the Third Order. The topic of the retreat was The Way of St. Francis: The Way of Transformation.

Some notes from the retreat are included in the May newsletter:
"The Way: Your word is a lantern to my feet and a light upon my path. The Word becme flesh. The Way is the path."
"Humility: A willingness to yield. Can only be learned in community. It is a dialogue with one another and God. We can learn through dialogue, it can change our prespective. Preconceived ideas are blocks, as is arrogance. We must be open to hear. We are all to be good earth within which the seed

We must be open to hear. We are all to be good earth within which the seed of God can grow. God sharing is dialogue. Humility is to listen and share."
"Love: A way of transforming. Love of God is learned in community. God accepts us where we are and who we are. In community we can be stripped of our illusions and still be accepted and received by God. Our restoration builds greater compassion, mutual love, respect and honor."

"Joy: The gift of Joy is rooted in trust that all will be well, and is nutured in thanksgiving. It activates memory and helps enable us to be open to God..."


"Transformation is renewal. Prayer is our response to God in deeds and thought, with or without words. The Word of God resounds in our heart."

Dear Joanne,

Here are some more reflections, these coming specifically out of my ministry at the detention center. The first was written in response to my contact with a particular inmate.

#### Robert

Lord, it seemed as though I held his hand for an eternity. His skin was hot and dry, corroborating the feverish glaze in his eyes. His grasp was almost frantic in its intensity as if he were trying to squeeze out of my hand something to hang onto that would sustain him through his agony. His eyes were haunting, reflecting the intensity of his pain and his confusion. The tormented expression on his face, the bleeding sores on his body and the stream of verbalized anguish that was unleashed as he clung to my hand all attested to his suffering, a microcosm of the suffering of a wounded and broken world.

Lord, help him to find you. He so desperately needs your strength and your support to enable him to cope with the understanding of what is happening to him and to sustain him through the trials that lie ahead. Help him to receive the Good News of your salvation and to find in you the healing and restorative power of your limitless love. Help him to surrender his pain to you and to find in you the beauty of your perfect peace.

AMEN

The other two are my personal prayers as a person called to a ministry of pastoral care in the environment of a detention center:

Dear God, go with me into this place today. Send your Holy Spirit to work through the imperfect human vehicle that I am to bring the power of your perfect love to your suffering children behind these bars. Where I can help, help me to help. Where I cannot help, help me to do no harm.

Use me, Lord. You have made me as I am and I am yours to use as you will.

Use my eyes to see the fear and helplessness etched on my brother's face.

Use my ears to hear the hopelessness and isolation in his words.

Use my mind to understand what it is to be where he is in this desolate place.

Use my arms to hold him while he sobs out the agony of a broken life.

Use my hands to bring your healing power to this wounded child of yours.

Use my pain to open me to share in his suffering.

Use my mouth to proclaim to him the Good News of your salvation.

Use my heart as a vehicle for your all-embracing love.

Use me, Lord. Use all of me.



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#### FELLOWSHIP OF THE LIVING ROSARY

Don Carlson wrote something in his newsletter that I'd like to share with a wider Franciscan audience...

"I regret that there so many miles separating all of us, but, as St. Paul wrote to the Colossians, we may be absent from one another in body, yet we are together in spirit. I never feel alone when saying the Offices, meditating, praying a common prayer, etc. I take literally the fact that we are 'one in Christ Jesus' and in the spirit, physical time and space are eliminated...We are 'gathered together in his name,' we make our 'common supplication,' and it matters not whether we are physically together 'NOW.'"

The day began with morning prayer and ended with brown bag lunches outside on the church steps; an unexpected delight of the morning was Gayle Roberts' offering of an assortment of muffins, shared during times of fellowship.



Their Fellowship Spring Retreat was held at the lake house of Liz Peacock's parents on Lake Nottely, near Blairsville. ## The TAU CROSS

As a new postulant I was very interested in anything Franciscan; but I was especially curious about the use of the Tau because I was unfamiliar with this cross. The following, taken from The Tau by Damien Vorreaux, O.F.M., Franciscan Herald Press, 1979, answered a lot of my questions about this ancient symbol. Although we will probably never know exactly why Francis came to see the Tau as a symbol of his ministry and life, Vorreaux does give a likely possibility in Francis' experience at the Fourth Lateran Council.

"Pope Innocent III opened the Council on November 11, 1215, with an admirable and eloquent sermon which immediately aroused universal interest....The pope makes his own the words of God to his prophet Ezekiel : 'Pass through the center of the city and mark with a Tau the foreheads of the men who weep and wail because of all the abominations which are committed there!' And he adds: 'The Tau is the last letter of the Hebrew alphabet and its form traces a cross like the one which was presented before attaching Pilate's placard. The Tau is the sign borne on the forehead if one is to manifest the radiance of the cross in all one's conduct; if, as the Apostle says, one crucifies one's flesh with its vices and sins; if one affirms: "I want to put my glory in nothing other than the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by which the world has been crucified for me and I to the world.... Therefore, be champions of the Tau and of the Cross!"'

"What was Francis' reaction? He took the discourse of Innocent III as a message addressed personally to him. The pope had said: 'mercy will be granted to those who bear the Tau, a mark of a life of penance and renewal in Christ. And so Francis wanted to sign himself with the Tau, and his Brothers along with him; the Tau will become the sign of the Order's mission."

THIRD SOUTH CENTRAL STATES REGIONAL CONVOCATION, April 24-26, 1987

Thirty-three tertiaries and guests attended this year's South Central States Convocation in Broken Arrow, Oklahoma (just outside of Tulsa). The site was the Roman Catholic Convent of Our Lady of Sorrows, which is a community of the Sisters of the Sorrowful Mother, who are themselves Third Order Franciscans; so we were among family in more ways than one.

Fr. Masud Syedullah, our Provincial Chaplain, opened Convocation Friday evening with a prayer, followed by brief announcements and introductions, and then some joyful singing led by Chris Cloke of the Tulsa Fellowship. We then said Compline.

Compline was followed by the first of three meditations on "Instruments of Peace," given by Br. Robert Hugh, SSF. He opened with a song: "This is holy ground. God's given us holy ground. .." and the whole group spontaneously joined in—it was beautiful! Br. Robert spoke about God's forgiveness being already present, waiting for us to accept it. He told us that this is an example of how God "lives dangerously." He also spoke about the open arms gesture of Christ, to embrace all the world, both good and bad, because bad can be redeemed. We ask in the Prayer of St. Francis not that we would replace hate, but that we would sow love where ever hate is, hate being a distortion of love. Br. Robert gave a total of three meditations, the last of which was as a homily at the Eucharist, Saturday morning.

After lunch on Saturday, Marie Webner, our Assistant Chaplain, gave a talk on the meaning of Community in the Third Order. She discussed the expressions we have of community, which include fellowships, convocations, and regular reporting. She also discussed the necessity of open, honest dialogue.

Following that talk, we divided into two groups: aspirants, postulants and novices had a question and answer session on formation with Mary Ann Jackman and Alden Whitney, our Women's and Men's Formation Directors respectively; life professed members met with Dee Dobson, our Minister Provincial, and Marie Webner to discuss several issues, which included the necessity of a "call" to be part of the Third Order, and the relationship between the Third Order and other kinds of organizations and movements in the Church. Following these meetings, the Formation Directors held a training session for novice counselors. Then there was free time until the evening, when we had a party and time for sharing and singing and enjoying and rejoicing 'til the wee hours.

Sunday morning Dee Dobson gave a talk on the meaning of the House of Bishop's official recognition of the Third Order as a Christian Community, including the implications of the Church Canons involved (that were printed in a recent "Information Sheet"). She also spoke about the up-coming International Congress of the Society of St. Francis in England. Fr. Syedullah also participated in that presentation.

Following that we had a final business meeting, in which it was decided to meet again next year at the same facility (April 22-24, 1988 are the dates). We chose as our theme for the meditations "The Three Aims of the Society" as defined in The Principle and Rule. I was asked to serve as Convenor of the Convocation for next year again.

At Eucharist Sunday we had two novicings: Jeanie Campbell and Mary Miller. We also had one admission of a postulant: Mary Beth Alban. Fr. Syedullah celebrated and preached.

Special thanks are owed to Gail Smith for registrations and mailings, Kathy Gearhart for program and scheduling, Jan Syedullah for hospitality and local arrangements, Chris Cloke for music, song books and transportation to and from the airport, John and Betty Marinoni for music, Mary Lillian Wilkes for clean-up detail, John Wheeler for photography and transportation to and from the airport, the Tulsa Fellowship for Friday night's dinner, Fr. Jim Disbrow for arranging liturgy, Patronalia Hanley for name tags, Br. Robert for his delightful and moving meditations, and Dee Dobson, Marie Webner, Masud Syedullah, Alden Whitney and Mary Ann Jackman for their work on presentations.

HENRY BIRD is a Missioner in the Diocese of the Rio Grande. He sent a recent newsletter, <u>Urban Indian Ministry "Call."</u> In it is an article of his, and though it has to do with Easter, it seems appropriate for any time:

## - "HE WAS KNOWN TO THEM IN THE BREAKING OF THE BREAD" - (Lk. 24:35)

Following our Easter homily three members of the congregation offered their spiritual reflections on the meaning of our celebration.

One person reminded us that Easter really is an ancient celebration among Native American people and cultures and goes back to a time long before Europeans came to this land. Indian cultures and traditions throughout the ages have rejoiced in the return of life in the spring - with an understanding that the Creator brings new life out of death. The Christian's Easter faith affirms and rejoices in this truth as it celebrates the Resurrection.

Another sharer read a traditional prayer of her people reminding all that traditional Indian spirituality is not in conflict with the Christian Gospel, but, in today's world especially, may come closer to Biblical spirituality than does contemporary society.

Finally, we were reminded, too, that in participating in and sharing the Communion, we were sharing in each other and being strengthened for sharing in ministry in and for the world.

As on the road to Emmaus, in the familiar story in Luke 24, we also today, come to know the Risen Lord in sharing - sharing where we come from, who we are, and what we are for.

The Lord is known to us, too, as we share "in the breaking of the Bread." (hb)

#### **NAAMAN**

My bibliography for this message consists of the church program from the sixth Sunday after Epiphany, and the tag from a tea bag.

The tag has a message on it . . . "Let me read with open eyes the book my days are writing, and learn."

The first lesson on that sixth Sunday after Epiphany was from II Kings 5:1-14, the story about Naaman, the leper. Naaman was angry when Elisha merely told him to wash in the Jordan to get rid of his leprosy. He said, "I thought he would surely come out to me, and stand, and call on the name of the Lord his God, and wave his hand. . . ." Naaman just about missed being cured but his servants pointed out

that if he had been told to do some "great thing" he would have done it, so why not just try washing in the river? and he did, and was cured.

When I read with open eyes the book my days are writing, I learn that I'm often like Naaman, expecting God to do some fancy thing... "wave his hand and cure the leper." Instead, he's just telling me to do these ordinary things, so that what he has in mind for me can come to pass.

Sometimes I get an idea of what I should be doing, what new activity I should take up, what person I should get acquainted with . . . and instead I get something completely different. When I'm able to look at it with open eyes and a sense of perspective, it does make sense, and I feel that God was waving his hand over the place after all.



Living Alone: The Spiritual Dimension by Martin Israel (Cross-road, NY \$7.95) and Walking with Loneliness by Paula Ripple F.S.P.A. (Ave Maria Press \$4.95)

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

JUDITH GILLETTE, Convener of the Massachusetts Fellowship, wrote in their April newsletter update of the time she spent during Lent, sharing "this little Eucharistic chapel with so many, the old and the young; men and women..."

She concluded: "I have come away from these hours renewed in faith, for the people daily continue to come, continue to pray.

"Peace will not come because world leaders sign paper (though we must seek that, too). Peace comes through the finished work of Jesus on the cross, and the continued prayer and faithfulness of His little ones. May we be counted among these faithful!"

Their May newsletter began with a description of their April meeting:

"The day was gorgeous, sunny and warm -- our area chaplain, Bob Durand, drove with postulant Rik Fitch from Burlington, VT to join us. Steve Miles walked from Cambridge (as a pilgrimage to profession...). Adrienne missed her train in Boston, and my husband David took a fast trip into the museum of science to pick her up, with time to spare. Most others arrived mostly un-eventfully."

They discussed at that meeting the fact that, "As an order in this Diocese, we are hidden to the point of anonymity. Being hidden and humble is good -- appearing to be a 'phantom order' is ineffective, and, I think, was never Francis's intent." So they are planning to announce meetings and events in the diocesan paper and put up small posters in churches where tertiaries reside. They will also have a booth at Diocesan Convention. "We must let ourselves be found by those whose hearts are being touched by God in a Franciscan way."

Nancy Kangas will take photographs of Fellowship events. Adrienne Dillon will record past history of the group, talking with Mona Hull about the beginnings of the Fellowship many years ago. Judith will put information in the papers.

The newsletter also included a brief biography of one of their members.

The 7th Annual Northeast Conference, with the theme of Healing, will take place August 28-30 at Graymoor.

They plan a Francistide Renewal of Vows in October at Mona Hull's in Rockport. They will have a picnic by the sea.

Sabbath Time: Understanding and Practice for Contemporary Christians by Tilden Edwards (Seabury Press. \$10.95)

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
